GOALS OF THE CHIP: SAMPLE WORK PLAN

PRIORITY AREA: Healthy Beginnings

OVERARCHING VISION: Reduce the incidence of pediatric asthma attacks in Sutter County children and youth

STAKEHOLDERS:

Sutter County Public Health, Sutter County Superintendent of Schools and various Sutter County school districts, Adventist Health and Rideout (AHRO), Ampla Health, Harmony Health, Peach Tree Health, Sutter North

OBJECTIVES:

Reduce hospital emergency department visits for asthma attacks by 20% within three years.

Reduce visits to the school nurse for asthma attacks by 30% within 2 years.

Definition of Homelessness

According to the **Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Point-in Time (PIT) Count Methodology** homelessness is defined as:

 Sheltered: "An individual or family living in a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangement (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs for low-income individuals)"

Unsheltered: "An individual or family with a primary nighttime residence that is a
public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping
accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, abandoned building, bus or
train station, airport, or camping ground"

BURDEN OF HOMELESSNESS IN SUTTER COUNTY

- Between 2019 and 2020 homelessness has increased in Sutter County, California and Nationwide
- The 2021 Point in Time (PIT) count identified 371 people experiencing homelessness
 - 59% of those experiencing homelessness were Non-Hispanic White Residents
 - Most residents experiencing homelessness were between the ages 25-35 (19%) and ages 55-64 (19%)
- People experiencing homelessness are **more** likely to have:
 - Physical Disabilities or chronic medical conditions
 - Mental health and substance use conditions



SOCIAL DETERMINANTS OF HEALTH AND HOMELESSNESS

- According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the social determinants of health (SDOH) are the nonmedical factors that influence health outcomes. They are the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live, and age, and the wider set of forces and systems shaping the conditions of daily life
 - Social factors including the lack of economic stability, housing instability, lack of access to health care and social supports and connections, among others, may increase the potential of experiencing homelessness



LOCAL STRATEGIES AND FUNDING

- The Sutter-Yuba Homeless Consortium (SYHC) drafted their 2023 strategic plan focusing on the following priorities:
 - 1. Homelessness Prevention
 - 2. Support for Shelter & Housing
 - 3. Homeless and Community Partnerships
 - 4. Health Services

 SYHC is currently finalizing this plan after reviewing final public comment

GOALS & STRATEGIES FOR ADDRESSING HOMELESSNESS



Strategy A. Homelessness Prevention

- Limit first-time homelessness
- Prevent returns to homelessness



Strategy B. Support for Shelter & Housing

- Develop affordable housing options for extremely low-income households
- Further research potential housing models (tiny house, modular, conversions)
- Improve outreach to landlords, property management companies, and developers
- Broader systematic support for the Homeless Data Management Information System (HMIS) and Coordinated Entry (CE) Systems



Strategy C. Homeless and Community Partnerships

- Support the business community's efforts to engage with individuals experiencing homelessness
- Create opportunities for homeless persons to get involved in the community
- · Improve awareness and resources on social media for local community
- Work with partner agencies and businesses to employ individuals experiencing homelessness



Strategy D. Health Services

- · Provide additional support for the Street Medicine team
- Increase mobile service engagement
- Provide additional support for outreach teams
- Create safe respite location for sick/injured individuals with no other resources to recover

LOCAL STRATEGIES AND FUNDING

- Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP):
 - Round 1: provided funding to support regional coordination and expand capacity to address immediate homeless challenges
 - Funding utilized for Better Way operations, a 40-bed emergency shelter program
 - **Rounds 2 & 3:** provided funding to build on regional collaboration and support the development of an affordable housing project
- Homeless and Housing Instability (HHIP): a voluntary Medi-Cal Managed Care Incentive Program that aims to improve health outcomes by addressing housing insecurity and instability. Priority areas include:
 - Partnership and capacity to support referrals for services
 - Infrastructure to coordinate and meet member housing needs
 - Delivery of services and member engagement

SWOT ANALYSIS

Considering the current activities and efforts surrounding homelessness, identify key **S**trengths, **W**eaknesses, **O**pportunities and **T**hreats that exist in our community to address homelessness

- Facilitator will guide each group through the SWOT analysis
 - Findings from the SWOT analysis will inform our work developing the goals and objectives to address homelessness



HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION & MITIGATION FOCUS AREAS

Considering and encompassing the HUD definition of homelessness, this workgroup will aim to develop the goals, objectives and strategies to address homelessness by focusing on the following prevention categories:







Primary prevention:

prevent those who are precariously housed from entering homelessness.

Secondary prevention:

provide housing to those that are homeless and prevent those entering housing from recidivism.

Tertiary prevention:

ensure safe access to shelter, housing, and timely, adequate healthcare access to those who are experiencing homelessness.

DETERMINING OVERARCHING VISION STATEMENTS

The National Association of County & City Health Officials (NACCHO) defines **goals/overarching vision** as:

- Broad or general statement of desired change or end state
 - Can refer to a population's (or sub-group's) health status
 - Can refer to a characteristic of the public health system
 - Should be measurable, but does not need to have a means to measure it embedded
 - Example:
 - Reduce the incidence of pediatric asthma
 - Increase healthy eating in Sutter County

DETERMINING OVERARCHING VISION STATEMENTS

Group Activity:

- Considering the findings from the SWOT analysis and the work your organization and community partners are already doing:
 - What is the **desired state** or **outcome** for this priority area?
 - What do we need to do in this priority area to significantly change the number of homeless in Sutter County?
 - Thinking about who is working on this now, what approaches will make the largest impact in this priority area?

OBJECTIVES

- Objectives:
 - measurable statement of the specific desired change/end state
 - describe the steps that will take place in order to achieve the change(s) described in the overarching vision
 - are SMART:



Example: By January 31, 2024, increase adult physical activity in Sutter County by 10%

Example: Increase walking paths in Sutter County by 5 miles within 3 years

DEVELOPING OBJECTIVES

- Objective Activity:
 - Develop 2-3 objectives for each finalized overarching vision statement
 - What do we want to accomplish? How will the objective accomplish the vision statement?
 - Who is the focus population?
 - How will this group accomplish this objective?
 - How will we measure the impact of this solution?
 - What is the time-frame we will accomplish the goal?
